Electric rate increase goes into effect on January 3, 2025


Memphis Light, Gas and Water's 2024 Budget included three annual 4% electric rate increases to fund a comprehensive plan to replace outdated infrastructure and modernize the grid with the goal of improving reliability and reducing outages.

Electric rates will increase by 4% starting with meters read on or after January 3, 2025. This is the second of three annual increases that will continue through 2026. The increase is expected to cost customers about \$5 per month.

Natural gas and water rates will remain unchanged for 2025.

Memphis: 10 years among lowest winter utility bills

Historically, Memphis customers have spent less for their winter utility bills than their counterparts in capturing the top ranking 20 times



since 1991. The 2024 ranking includes what a homeowner would pay for 1,000 kilowatt-hours (kWh) of electricity, 200 cubic feet (CCF) of gas and 10 CCF of water. Wastewater is no longer included. Dollar amounts have been rounded.


UTA President

MLGW,TVA offer lighting replacement incentive for small businesses

Memphis Light, Gas and Water has partnered with TVA EnergyRight to bring energy-efficient LED lighting upgrades to small businesses in our community.





Through the TVA EnergyRight Small Business Lighting Replacement program, small businesses may be eligible to receive an incentive covering up to 70% of the cost to upgrade to energy efficient LED lights. MLGW youth programs and community engagement

MLGW's commitment to community engagement extended to the next generation through youth programs and educational initiatives. In 2023, MLGW's STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) Educational Support Program engaged 40 students from Memphis-area schools in grades 3 to 5, led by coordinators from MLGW's Human Performance Department. Held on Saturdays, this program introduces students to STEM-related activities and careers, fostering curiosity and lifelong learning.

In collaboration with Memphis-Shelby County Schools and Southwest Tennessee Community College (SWTCC), we are proud to say that we launched the first Utility & Line Worker Boot Camp, which drew the participation of over 20 eager juniors and seniors from Whitehaven High School. In another partnership with SWTCC, called the M.A.C. (MLGW, AT&T, and Comcast) Workforce Initiative, the utility joins forces with AT&T and Comcast to cultivate skilled professionals for technical careers by providing training to students enrolled at SWTCC.



Recently, MLGW hosted the inaugural STEM conference at the utility's training center. Students from eight area schools attended the conference. MLGW's own Terminator and Conservation Girl also attended alongside an inflatable Water Mane, part of the utility's Power League superheroes.

10 low-cost steps you can take this winter

- 1. Caulk and weatherstrip around windows and doors to stop air leaks. Seal any gaps in floors and walls around pipes and electrical wiring.
- 2. Change filters monthly.
- 3. Replace incandescent bulbs with LED bulbs.
- **4.** Repair air leaks and seal and insulate heating system ductwork.
- **5.** Add insulation to your attic, crawl space and any accessible exterior walls. Add pipe insulation to the first five feet of water pipe coming from your water heater. Install light switch and electrical outlet seals on exterior walls.
- **6.** Install an ENERGY STAR® programmable thermostat appropriate for your type of heating system and set it at 68°F for heating.
- **7.** Look for the ENERGY STAR® label when replacing large or small appliances.
- **8.** Wrap your water heater with insulation or install an insulation blanket.
- **9.** Install aerating, low-flow faucets and shower heads and repair leaky faucets.
- **10.** Use power strips for home electronics and turn them off when equipment is not in use. TVs and DVD players still use power when plugged in to an outlet.



Winterize before everything freezes!

Remember to winterize your outdoor water faucets and irrigation system before a winter freeze. Water can freeze inside sprinkler housings and hoses and may burst or rupture parts. Clean and store sprinklers in a dry place. Disconnect hoses from their water source and drain them of any remaining water. Neatly coil and store hoses in a dry area. Also wrap and protect outside water faucets.



Operation Feed
